Tips for How to Lead a Small Group

3. Facilitate, Don't Preach

- Your role is to **guide the discussion**, not to teach a lesson. Encourage participation by asking open-ended questions.
- Keep the focus on engagement—let people share their insights and personal experiences.
- Call on class members by name to help everyone engage.

4. Encourage Application

- Help members apply the Bible to their daily lives by asking, "How does this apply to you?" or "What action will you take?"
- Suggest practical steps for living out faith during the week.

5. Be Flexible but Stay on Track

- While it's important to follow the study, allow the Holy Spirit to guide conversations. Sometimes, people need to discuss personal matters or pray more than study.
- However, gently **steer the group back** when it goes too far off-topic.

6. Encourage Relationships

- Foster connections outside of meetings through social activities, prayer chains, or check-ins.
- Encourage accountability partners or small prayer groups within the group.

7. Pray Together

- Close each meeting with prayer, inviting everyone to share their requests.
- Consider rotating prayer leadership to involve more members.

8. Follow Up

- Reach out to absent members to show you care.
- Send group messages to encourage and remind members of key points from the meeting.

9. Handle Conflict with Grace

- Be a peacemaker if disagreements arise, always pointing back to Scripture and love.
- Address any issues directly but with kindness and humility.
